
This day in December in Portslade History...


<u>Cathedral</u>, the work of <u>Sir</u> Christopher Wren, was opened. The previous Cathedral had been destroyed in the Great Fire of London in 1666. Portslade firm Sussex Asphalte won a national award for their renovation work on the Cathedrals iconic dome.



December 3rd 1932

The Picturedrome Cinema in North Street, Portslade, underwent an upgrade. The 300 seater cinema was equipped for sound. The first 'talkie film' (The Jazz Singer) was in 1927 so five years later sound on films was wide-spread.





December 6th 1312


The Lord of Portslade Manor was granted a charter by King Edward II to hold a fair at Portslade annually on 6th December, the Feast Day of Saint Nicholas and the traditional start of Christmas build up.

December 12th 1935

Portslade Council recieved a letter from a building developer requesting permission to name a new road in Mile Oak as Chrisdory Road. The road was named after his two children - Chris and Dorothy.






December 15th 1984

Portsladers enjoyed listening to 'Do They Know It's Christmas' by Band Aid. It is a charity song written by Bob Geldolf and Midge Ure to raise money for the 1983-1985 famine in Ethiopia. It entered the chart at number 1 and stayed there for 5 weeks. At the time, it was the biggest selling single ever in the UK, with sales of over 3.5 million. The song has since been re-recorded three times (1989, 2004, 2014) to continue raising money

for the charity.

December 19th 1843



December 25th 1644

Christmas was banned in Portslade (and the rest of England!) No presents, no food, no drink and no singing. Members of the government felt that the religious meaning of Christmas had been forgotten and so banned the holiday festivities. Some people still celebrated in secret until Christmas was once again legal...almost 20 years later!

December 30th 1595

Sir William West (a Lord of Portslade Manor) died. In his life, he was tried for poisoning and killing his uncle leading him to be imprisoned in the

Tower of London. He later was convicted of treason for plotting against the Queen.
