FOREST SCHOOL







The sewing season has begun and while waiting until certain there won't be another frost, we have been using the greenhouse for preparation. Biodegradable pots have been made with newspaper and seeds such as radish sewn. These are already growing ready to be replanted outside.

We have been noticing signs of Spring with the arrival of hundreds of daffodils around the school site and a wonderful display in The Retreat area. Blossom has appeared on the branches in the Forest area and we have been learning about the need to prune and cut back to encourage new growth.



The children undertook a project to turn some old tyres into flower pots. It was heavy work filling them with earth and compost. Now we wait patiently to see the flowers appear.

Den building has been high on the agenda as a place to keep warm while taking in the delights of being outdoors. We have strung up tarps, added items around the forest for camouflage and used a firm favourite when it comes to imaginary play- giant cardboard boxes.

Eco themes are a constant part of Forest School and with that we been on the lookout for any pesky plastic litter that has drifted into the hedges and corners of our outdoor spaces. These, along with saved bottle tops have been used for making an art work with a global message and of local importance being a coastal city 'Make our sea plastic free'.

Also, bracelet beads have been recycled to decorate salt dough pots.

A MESSAGE FROM YEAR SIX



Firstly, can we say a huge thank you to the parents for making time to meet us at the consultations this term - it was lovely to see you again. A few common concerns cropped over the meetings so we will address them here:

- SATs outcomes will not affect your child's secondary school placement.
- SATs marks will be published with your child's end of year report.
- We will continue to teach and get your child ready for secondary school after SATs week.
- · Residential is still going ahead.

Reading - We are coming to an emotional end to our fabulous book When the Sky Falls. The children have loved getting to know the characters and watching them develop their relationships as emotions run high in this story based on real events during The Blitz. They have also really enjoyed reading our quality carousel books and having the opportunity to discuss what they have read within their groups.



Writing - Our topic of World War 2 has really ignited the children's imagination. Everyone has made excellent progress in their writing skills while writing letters from soldiers to their loved ones back home; writing a first-person recount of their trip to the air-raid shelter at Downs Junior school as well as researching the life of Anne Frank and creating her biography.

Maths - The year 6 children have made us extremely proud by putting in 110% effort into their maths learning: not only in their regular lessons but their extra ones too to make up for what they missed during COVID. Keep up the hard work!

Art - We have been blown away by the high-quality outcomes of Pop Art. The children have been truly inspired by the likes of Roy Lichtenstein, Andy Warhol and Yayoi Kusama and created their own original pieces.

Next Term:

Our new topic will be Crime and Punishment where the children will learn about the history of crimes and how punishments have evolved throughout the centuries.

A MESSAGE FROM YEAR FIVE



Year Five have been hard at work THINKING BIG and beyond! We have continued our learning about space with a fascinating trip to the science museum and observatory at Herstmonceux. Here we were able to learn how telescopes are used to observe the mysteries of the sky. We were also able to develop our understanding of life in space, including how rockets are launched and the skills needed by astronauts to manipulate machinery in space.







We have also learnt about life on the ISS (International Space Station) within our explanation writing. Ask your child to explain what you might actually be seeing if you think you've spotted a shooting star! Back down on Earth, using our Mile Oak bikes we learnt about forces and how friction can be used to help us. We explored the pulley mechanism too, discovering how pulleys can reduce the force needed to lift a load. In geography, we have found out about the regions of the world and how they can be described by their physical features and climate. We also studied how the water cycle works - important to know about when you live in England!

Next term, the texts we will be reading are 'The Hero Twins' and 'The Explorer' which we will be using to help us go back in time to learn about the Ancient Mayan civilisation, their lives, art and mythical stories.

Year 3 have had a fantastic half term learning all about the UK and Europe. They have been able to identify some great similarities and differences between the two countries; focusing on climate, currency, human and physical features. They have created some great fact pages, bringing together all of the facts that they have learnt. They also loved making their own salad niçoise. Lots of the children impressed themselves (and us), with how much they liked some of the ingredients that they hadn't tried before!


The children have really enjoyed reading 'The Train Mouse' during whole class guided reading sessions. Their favourite task being an 'Emotion Graph', where they had to really think about how the characters were feeling at particular points of the story and why they felt this way.

Next term the topic will be 'Ancient Egypt'. During next half term, the children will read 'A Mummy Ate My Homework' in their class guided reading sessions. They will also explore and design their own canopic jars, exploring different techniques and methods when doing so. The children will unpick the features of a newspaper report when exploring research about the tomb discovery of Tutankhamun and will re-write their own version. Towards the end of the term, the children will take another trip to Brighton Museum, where they will take part in a mummification workshop.

Next half term, the children will also take a visit to PACA library, where they will read take part in a paired reading session with some of the PACA students. This is something we know the children will love and can't wait to be a part of.



We have been excited by the first signs of spring and have sketched some daffodils using different types of pencils to create effect for the front covers of our learning journals. Currently we are investigating what plants need to grow and how different conditions can affect growth.

Next half term, we will be learning all about 'Marvellous Medicine', which includes finding out about Mary Seacole, Edith Cavell and Florence Nightingale and the impact they had on nursing.

A fantastic half term with 'Tell me a Tale' as our topic!

In English we have read many different versions of Traditional Tales, and had a terrific visit from the Rainbow Theatre Company!

Children sat 'in the round' and had an engaging time with the actors and stories! We joined in with World Book Day, and shared books with older children in KS2.

In phonics, the children are progressing through the sounds of each phase, and this is becoming evident in the writing that we do. Well done, children!

In Music we have made and performed Sound Stories, based on Little red riding Hood, playing percussion instruments for sound effects.

We have played drums, sung songs and chants in our African Drumming Workshop!





In Maths, we are now learning about place value, and how numbers are made. This is important for accurate number writing, understanding how numbers are made of tens and ones.

In Science and Art we are looking at plants and flowers closely, naming parts of a plant and drawing them in detail, exploring the work of Georgia O'Keefe to inspire us!

Next term we shall be looking at Animals in detail, identifying parts of animals and also how animals are grouped. We shall be using the text - 'You're Called What?' by Kes Grey, to inspire Animal report writing. We shall also be visiting the Sea Life Centre in May, to inform our understanding of animals and groups.




A MESSAGE FROM RECEPTION



Another wonderful half term draws to a close here in Reception. This term we have been on a geographical adventure as part of our topic 'Near and Far'.

When we arrived back from our holidays we discovered we had



some visitors. Much excitement ensued as we discovered two friendly aliens had joined us to take us on an exciting adventure to places near and far. Hank and Max, our alien visitors, were thoroughly welcomed by the children with an abundance of letters



London and Paris landmarks and buildings. We had 'fry-ups' in our London café and thoroughly enjoyed making delicious crepes to support our learning about Paris. We went on bus tours and aeroplane flights in our outdoor learning area. We wrote our first entries in our travel journals as travel experts.

Next Hank and Max told us of their adventures to the artic countries. We explored ice, talking about freezing and melting, and learnt lots about the animals that live in the Polar Regions.



Mid-way through our topic we took to the roads on an adventure! Excitedly we boarded a coach to Gatwick Aviation museum. The children loved exploring a huge range of aircraft and flying machines. It was such a hands-on day. We sat in a first class cabin of a modern aircraft, we dressed up as pilots, we tried our hand at being a helicopter pilot and we lowered the wheels for landing using wheels from a real aeroplane. The volunteers were so knowledgeable and kind to our children. We even chatted to a 90 year old Royal Air Force veteran aboard a Shakleton aircraft. He told us how he flew the plane high up in the clouds. To top off the trip we watched aeroplanes take off over our heads from the runway at Gatwick airport. What a wonderful experience!



Back at school our alien friends shared their trip to the continent of Africa. Again, we learnt about African animals, the habitat of the African Savanna and we had a wonderful drumming session with Daniel, a real-life musician. Everyone had a drum and he took us on a 'banging' journey into the jungle.

The alien's final stop was to Australia. Here they told us we could find some amazing, yet dangerous, creatures. Lots of snake and crocodile themed activities and writing has taken place. Our dangerous animals vet surgeries have been very popular. We found out more about Australia using our selection of non-fiction texts and video clips. We explored our big science question of 'What makes animals dangerous?' We even have our own resident expert as one Dragonfly has recently returned from her own adventure down-under!

Lucy, a dental nurse, also paid us a visit. She knew we had been thinking about animals' teeth and jaws, and also about our own teeth and keeping them healthy. Lucy was very impressed with our knowledge and skills. She just helped us 'brush up' on these! Did you know current advice is to not wet your toothbrush and not to rinse after brushing? Let the toothpaste and the circling brush strokes do their job!

Our half term culminated in a brilliant hands-on animal encounter when the company RepTylers visited us. The children were amazed and intrigued by the animals they meet, including the albino python who is over 3 metres long, and Charlotte, the ever so gentle Chile Rose tarantula.

We said goodbye to our alien friends as they returned to their planet, Palnet Zog. We thought about what is beyod our own Earth by learning a little bit about space and the planets in our solar system.

So many wonderful stories supported our learning throughout this topic. The Queen's Hat, Everybody Bonjour, The Leopard's Drum and Alan's scary teeth to name but a few.

Our next topic is sure to be another fun-filled escapade as we disappear into a world of make-believe. 'Can you imagine?' is the title and 'Storyland' is our destination. The topic includes giants, fairies, unicorns, dragons, knights, castles, magic, wonder, imagination and fun! We will meet new characters, discover new plots and settings and welcome the return of some familiar traditional tale characters that we know and love. This will all be supporting our communication and language skills, our reading comprehension and our story writing abilities. We're also off on another adventure, where could it be?

It is always a privilege to read the children's writing across the school. The share their work with enthusiasm. Here are tasks from across the school.




Reception




Year 4



We wrote him letters to thank him for allowing us to visit his palace and to show how impressed we were!


Year 5

GEOGRAPHY



This year the children have explored a range of different geographical skills and knowledge across the year groups. There has been a real focus on vocabulary when working geographically, ensuring that the children have clear definitions of the vocabulary that they have been learning about and transferring this into their writing. We have also been making use of our fantastic outdoor area when exploring fieldwork skills.

Here are just some of the fantastic geographical skills that they children have been learning so far this year:

Reception have been travelling 'near and far' in their recent topic. They started by exploring London and Paris, then virtually travelled further afield to the Arctic and Antarctic, African Savannahs and finally arrived in Australia. They have been learning about our wonderful world, the similarities and differences between places, how to travel around it and the many animals we have on our planet. Recently, they went to Gatwick Aviation museum to experience the amazing flying machines that might carry us around our world and watched as aeroplanes took off over their heads.





Year 1 have been locating the UK in maps and atlases. They have also been thinking about OUR place in the world, using the text 'Me on the Map'. They have made individual flip map books, to reinforce our place in the world, thinking about their home, street, city and country.

Year 2 have been using globes and atlases to name and locate the UK's countries, cities and surrounding seas. They have also been learning to name and locate the seven continents and five oceans of the world and explain where they are in relation to the equator.

Year 3 have been exploring countries within Europe and have been comparing the similarities and differences between The U.K. and France. They have been experts when using the atlases to ask and answer geographical questions and why landscapes are the way they are.

Year 4 have learnt about the key aspects of the water cycle and have created some fantastic diagrams to represent this.



Year 6 went to visit the Railway Land Wildlife Trust to explore rivers. They learnt about how the rain water flows down to the water table and why we have floods. They explored how to measure the rate of the river flow using their maths skills. The children also tested their map reading skills when studying satellite images of Lewes.
