#### LITTLE OAKS NURSERY





What a busy and fun filled half-term we've had in the nursery. The amazing weather has inspired lots of water play and cooling walks around the field and forest school. We have been learning about growing and life cycles. Our sunflowers are growing well and they have needed lots of water too!

We have shared key texts with the children starting with Lenny Has Lunch by Ken Wilson-Max. This book prompted lots of talk about healthy eating and we played with real fruit and vegetables in the home corner. We also made some lovely vegetable print paintings and even made a boat, like the boat in the story. We hope you have been singing the focus nursery rhyme, Row, Row, Row, Your Boat, at home too.

We then continued our key text activities after reading Handa's Surprise. This story provided lots of opportunities to talk about hot countries, taste different fruits and balance objects on our heads. The children were incredibly good at balancing — we even challenged ourselves to egg and spoon races in the nursery. This book inspired another key focus rhyme - Humpty, Dumpty, Sat on the Wall!

We have 22 children leaving Little Oaks to join Reception in September. We have been busy taking them for visits to their new classrooms and to explore the outside area. They have had lots of opportunities to meet the reception staff team and we hope they all have lots of fun next year. It has been wonderful to see them all grow into the lovely reception-ready children they are now. We are excited to watch them on their journey as they progress through the school.

Good luck to you all, you have all been amazing during our first term at Little Oaks. To the children returning to Little Oaks in September we look forward to seeing you again.

Rhubarb has never been more popular! We were kindly donated many ornamental plants and seeds which have added to our stunning display of wildflowers including poppies, hollyhocks and cornflowers. These brightly coloured, and scented, blooms bringing essential pollinating insects into the garden.

Even our perennials made it through the winter. We waited in trepidation to see if the banana tree came back to life, and it did!



It now stands as a grand centrepiece to the sunny border, though is unlikely to ever produce fruit in the UK climate. ## A MESSAGE FROM YEAR FIVE



That's a wrap! What a pleasure it has been to teach the children in Elder and Walnut class this year. We are extremely proud of them all for showcasing their courage and ambition this half term, which has led to some fantastic learning.

We continued with our geography focus after May half term, learning more about our local area by studying OS maps. The children are now able to identify key symbols on maps, measure distances using scale and even locate important places using 4 or 6 digit grid references. We took a field trip to Foredown Tower to identify both human and physical features of our local area, as well as sketching The Downs in preparation for our artist in residence that finished our fabulous term.



More about that later...

Our class reader – The Explorer – has continued to engage the children's love of reading, whilst inspiring their writing. Being such good predictors, we tasked our budding authors with writing the next chapter of the book and were blown away with the results. Their ability to write in the tone and style of a published author, whilst developing the story in keeping with existing settings and characters, was to be commended.

Mathematics learning focused on mastering fractions (ready for Year 6), as well as developing their knowledge in shape, area and perimeter, angles and co-ordinates. Our ukulele lessons have continued, with Sound Makers teaching the children well-known songs such as 'Wake Me Up' by Avicii and 'We Will Rock You' by Queen and we've seen a mature approach from all children during our important RSE learning.



There have been trips to the Mandir to learn more about Hinduism. A visit from a Fire Safety Officer to improve their knowledge of fire safety around the home and school. A visit to PACA to watch students perform 'Matilda the Musical' and a field walk to the Downs to support our art. The printmaking workshop, led by local artist Helen Brown, was a hit with the children and staff alike. Using tracing paper, the children carefully sketched their designs onto lino before using cutting tools to carve out their image. By adding an array of coloured inks, their prints came to life. It was wonderful to see their wide smiles when the final print was revealed.

A successful sports day, finished the half term, with every child giving their all.

We have taken the opportunity to use the class sets of bikes in the school whenever we can. It has been really heartening to see the children growing in confidence with these and making amazing progress with being able to ride a bike independently. We also got a lot out of our wheelchair basketball sessions.



The children worked really well together to produce an amazing assembly about Bees and their plight, which celebrated learning in lots of different subjects.

To cap things off, we have had an exciting and varied final Summer term. We had a very nice walking trip on to the South Downs. We did this to celebrate Brighton Walking Festival but it was also lovely to remind ourselves about this wonderful resource on our doorstep.



In class, we have learned lots in our Up, Up and Away topic, from creating our own islands, to our moving dragon models.

We have been utilising our amazing school grounds as much as possible by looking for living things there and classifying them. We are also surveying them for out Maths and Geography lessons. We have enjoyed using the field for our PE lessons and practicing athletic skills in preparation for Sports Day.

## A MESSAGE FROM YEAR THREE



What a fantastic term we have had this Summer. Although we are all tired in the heat, we have kept on going, learning some more interesting facts about Ancient Egypt. We went on the public bus and had a very informative trip to the Brighton Museum where we saw lots of real-life Egyptian artifacts. We also got to pull the brains out of an Ancient Egyptian person that was being mummified. Ewww!!! We found out about how his heart was weighed against a feather to see if he could go to the afterlife. It was lighter that the feather, so, thank goodness, he was able to enjoy the rest of his time in the Fields of Reeds.

Our writing this term has been focussing on writing instructions. We watched a drama about two slaves that had to work very hard and then wrote instructions on how to build a pyramid. We also did some drama to show the different stages of building a pyramid. Later, we had a very messy session mummifying an orange and wrote the instructions for this too. We had to take out its organs, dry the cavity and then fill it with spices and salt. We then wrapped the oranges in bandages and left them to dry. It was great fun.





Our Class reader is VarjakPaw by SF Said. It is about a Mesopotamian Blue kitten who has to learn a secret martial art, The Way, to save his family and all cats that keep going missing. We have loved finding out about his adventures and how he survived a city full of dangerous dogs, cat gangs and the mysterious Vanishings. Our love for reading has really developed and we think this is our favourite book so far.

To follow on from our last Science topic about Flowering Plants, we are finding out about the full Life Cycle of Plants. We have made model flowers and learnt the names of the male and female parts of a flower. This also fitted in with our PSHE and Sex Education where we thought about the differences and similarities between male and female bodies. In our PSHE we also looked carefully at how all families are different and unique but that every family is special.

In computing we have learnt how to collect data using a tally chart and then turn that information into a graph. We learnt that there are different types of graphs for different uses. We learnt how to change the graphs appearance; changing fonts and colour. In maths, we have concentrated on learning about fractions, which we have found tricky but we have preserved and are now getting the hang of it.



It has been lovely to get onto the field to do our PE this term. Although it has been hot and we had to take slightly shorter sessions, we have learnt the beginnings of how to play rounders and also practised our athletic skills ready for Sports Day. We were also lucky enough to have a go at Wheelchair Basketball, which was great fun!

Our Design and Technology this term has been to make Canopic Jars out of clay. We learnt how to make a coil pot and how to make a pinch pot. We then used tools to make the lids resemble a falcon, a baboon, a jackal or a human. These were used in Ancient Egyptian times to store body organs.

#### A MESSAGE FROM YEAR TWO



Year 2 have had a great time this half term learning all about 'Beautiful Brighton'. We started off our topic by learning about the history of Brighton; including The Royal Pavilion, Prince Regent and Martha Gunn. We went on an amazing trip, which included a tour from Martha Gunn herself. We visited the house where Martha grew up and ate our lunch in the Pavilion Gardens. We ended our tour with a ride on the Volk's Electric Railway.

After our trip, we loved making maps of the route we took and illustrated these with great pictures. In art, we learnt about printing and collage and we created some amazing pictures of Brighton beach using polystyrene printing tiles. These look amazing on the front cover of our learning journals!

Our trip inspired us to compare Brighton-then and now. In writing lessons, we looked at leaflets and thought about what features make a good leaflet. We wrote three sections about the history of Brighton, the Royal Pavilion and Brighton Beach. Then we created our own leaflets all about Brighton.





Year 2 also began reading chapter books for our whole class guided reading sessions. WE read Cavegirl and Rabbit and Bear. Our favourite part was where Rabbit ate his own poo! YUCK!

In maths we learnt how to tell the time to o'clock, half past, quarter to and quarter past. We created time diaries of our day. We also learnt all about symmetry and we painted our own butterflies with symmetrical wings.

We have also been busy practising our athletics events ready for sports day. We had SO much fun competing in our houses. To continue our theme of the local area we looked at microhabitats and went on a minibeast hunt around the school grounds.

All of the Year 2 adults are so proud of the children's hard work, not just this term but throughout the year! We cannot believe it is time for them to go to Year 3 and will miss them very much. We hope they enjoy a well-deserved, relaxing summer holiday! ... The Year 2 Team







## A MESSAGE FROM YEAR ONE

Wow - the year has flown by, and we are super proud of all our Year 1 children.

We have had terrific times and lively learning!

English - The main aims of writing in year 1 are to ensure that children understand what makes a full sentence, identifying nouns and verbs, and then expanding detail by using describing words.

Handwriting, punctuation and finger spacing is regularly practised. By the end of Year 1 children are able to read and check their writing, and to edit. This half term we have focused on instruction writing - making fruit salad in DT, inspired by Oliver's Fruit Salad, and guacomole as part of our reading about The Avocado baby! As part of our Jack and the Beanstalk learning, we have climbed the imaginary beanstalk and written creative ideas about what we might see there!



Science - The children know a lot about what a seed needs to grow, so our next step was to design and set up an experiment to prove what we know!

We have worked in Science teams, choosing places to put our seeds, making predictions, observing and recording results over time! The results have been surprising, so as Scientists we are discussing what we noticed and why we think it happened.



Geography - We have been using maps and plans to develop our understanding of place and direction. We have used the school plan to practise 'birds eye view', and to understand the purpose of a map key.

Finally, we have followed a trail around the school, navigating with the map, reading clues and finding the answers in the location marked on the map!

Music - This is a Year group that loves to sing and play. We have had lots of fun learning and performing. The last unit on Jack and The Beanstalk has bean great and the children know eight songs off by heart!

They have sung some of these in our Infant Assembly, along with our Glocks percussion club group. I look forward to extending the percussion club to our new Year 2's next year!

## A MESSAGE FROM YEAR ONE



Maths - Throughout Year 1 we have been focusing on mastering our number, addition and subtraction skills. We have practised our fluency by playing Numbots and practised our measuring skills in our forest school's area. The children have gained a real in-depth understanding of the composition of numbers up to 100. We have explored lots of different addition and subtraction strategies and have started to look at time, shape and money.

Reading - All of the children in Year 1 have worked really hard on their reading this year and we were amazed at the skills they demonstrated during their Phonics screening check. In Year 1 we read everyday and have really enjoyed reading a range of genre this year, including, fairy tales, poems, reccounts of events, non-fiction texts and instructions.

The children's abilities to ask and answer questions about what they have read is incredible. We cannot wait to see how they progress in Year 2.



DT and Art - We have had lots of fun in DT and Art this year. In Art we were inspired by the work of Georgia O'Keeffe and really enjoyed showing off our skills when creating our very own spring flower pieces using oil pastels. Back in the Autumn term we made our own clay leaves and wheeled vehicles too!

After our trip to the toy museum, we couldn't wait to make our own peg dolls. We have ended Year 1 by designing and making fruit salads - yummy!

PSHE - We have done lots of PSHE work this year, our class books are overflowing with fabulous work. We started Year 1 by reminding ourselves about the zones of regulation and school values.

During anti-bullying week we made, and signed, a class oath promising not to bully. Throughout the Autumn term, we made friendship potions and a class bucket of kindness. During Spring term, we explored gender equality and looked at lots of different ways that we can stay fit and healthy.

This term we have looked at family diversity, we listened to the story "Picnic in the park" and created our own "Real families rock!" poster.

Congratulations to all our Year Six children for their impressive progress in writing this year!



We know they will all be moving on to Year 1 ready for their continuing journey. You are our super star writers. Well done Reception!

Year 1 - The main aims of writing in year 1 are to ensure that children understand what makes a full sentence, identifying nouns and verbs, and then expanding detail by using describing words. Handwriting, punctuation and finger spacing is regularly practised. By the end of Year 1 children are able to read and check their writing, and to edit. This half term we have focused on instruction writing - making fruit salad in DT, inspired by Oliver's Fruit Salad, and guacomole as part of our reading about The Avocado baby! As part of our Jack and the Beanstalk learning, we have climbed the imaginary beanstalk and written creative ideas about what we might see there!



### WRITING UPDATE



**Year 2 -** Year 2 loved creating leaflets all about Brighton after our amazing trip. We wrote about The Royal Pavilion and Prince Regent, Martha Gunn and Brighton Beach. We worked hard to make our writing interesting to read by using sentence openers and conjunctions to extend our ideas. We then spent a long time publishing our work and adding pictures and captions. Don't they look amazing?

Year 3 - As part of the Year 3 topic of Ancient Egypt, we have written some instructions on 'How to Mummify an Orange'. We first mummified the orange (it was a bit messy) and then they thought carefully about the steps to tell someone else how to do it. Maybe you could try it at home! We used time adverbials, to make sure we knew the order of events. This helped to keep it in chronological order. We also used imperative verbs, these tell us what we must do, such as cut, scoop and wrap.

As teachers, we are so proud of how far they have come, building on their previous leaning. They are all amazing writers!





Year 4 - The children wrote wonderfully adventurous narratives about how they would escape from being stranded on a deserted island. They included a plethora of detailed descriptions to paint a picture for their readers. They have also written some fantastic diary entries by imagining they were a character in the book we are reading; The Miraculous Journey of Edward Tulane. They wrote about the traumatic events from one day in this toy rabbits life and his feelings about it.

Year 5 - Year 5 have continued reading 'The Explorer' this half term and feel like we are in the Amazon with the characters! Writing in the style of the book, we planned, wrote and published our own chapter thinking about the obstacles our adventurers might face in their search for freedom. Using 'The Explorer' as our stimulus, Year 5 explored the Downs. We then wrote a recount of our great adventure!



Year 6 - What an exciting writing term Y6 have had. After an input from one of our student teachers, the children set about creating a modern twist on some traditional fairy tales. Having completed the writing and editing process, they published their tales as mini, illustrated reading books. We met a range of characters, such as, Red, a 21st century blogger, who came across a wolfish character in New York, and Goldi meeting three criminals and their antics, as well as other recognisable characters from our childhood.

We also had a chance to stretch out writing muscles with some county-wide transition work. Using a book called 'Happy Here', which will be revisited in Y7, we took inspiration from some of the short stories. One story, 'A House Like No Other, following an unconfident young dancer, who overcomes her fears and delivers the highlight performance in a local ballet show, provided a springboard for a dance review. Children became newspaper critics and wrote up their reviews. They took this work with them for their Transition Day at their new secondary school

# MULTIPLICATION TABLES CHECK

Earlier in the term, children in Year 4 completed their Multiplication Tables Check (MTC). This is a times table test where children have to answer 25 questions on a variety of a times tables (from 2x to 12x), with a 6 second timer to answer each question. Everyone in Year 4 has worked incredibly hard on their times tables this year, during their counting stick sessions, maths fluency sessions, normal maths lessons and, of course, during their Times Table Rock Star slots!

Given the work they have put in, it is no surprise that we had some amazing results from the MTC.

Our school had 51% of children scoring 25/25 on the check. This is way above the National Average from last year which was 27% (there is no national data from this year to compare against yet).

We also had a mean average score of 19.9, compared to last year's national average of 19.8.

It is also of no surprise that Year 4 appear to have the most Rock Legends and Rock Heroes on TTRS! The whole year group are times table superstars and we a very proud of the work they have put in this year.

Keep rocking Year 4!

#### Autumn 1 Religious festival calendar

September	September					
September & October	Harvest Festival	Christian	Displays of various foods are made in churches and Sunday schools and services are held to give thanks for the goodness of God's gifts in nature.			
15 <sup>th</sup> – 17 <sup>th</sup> September	Rosh Hashanah	Jewish	5783 years from the creation of the world, this festival begins ten days of self-examination. The ram's horn (shofar) blown in the synagogue recalls Abraham's sacrifice of a ram instead of his son, Isaac. Apples dipped in honey are eaten in the hope of a 'sweet' new year. The greeting is 'Leshanah Tovah Tikatev' (may you be inscribed for a good year).			
24th - 25th September	Yom Kippur	Jewish	The last of the ten days of repentance, this 'Sabbath of Sabbaths' is the holiest day of the Jewish year. It is marked by 'afflicting the soul' – expressed through a total fast 25 hours long. Jews spend the eve and most of the day in prayer, asking for forgiveness for past wrongs and resolving to improve in the future. The Book of Jonah is read.			
29 <sup>th</sup> September	Sukkot	Jewish	This harvest festival recalls the 40 years the Jews spent in the wilderness on the way from slavery in Egypt to freedom in the Promised Land. A temporary hut or booth – called a <i>sukkah</i> – is used for eating meals and for visits and socialising. The roof, which has to be open in part to the elements, is covered with branches and decorated with fruit.			

2nd October	Gandhi Jayanti	Hindu	Gandhi Jayanti is an Indian national holiday that celebrates the birthday of Mahatma Gandhi, who is referred to as the 'Father of the Nation'. He was the driving force behind the foundation of the state of India. His birthday is celebrated with services, prayers using topics that glorify peace and non-violence, and the singing of Gandhi's favourite devotional song entitled 'Raghupati Raghav Raja Ram' (Ram Dhun for short).
6 <sup>th</sup> October	Shemini Atzeret	Jewish	This is the conclusion of Sukkot. This day is characterised by candle lighting and festive meals which reaches its climax with Simchat Torah when the conclusion—and restart—of the annual <i>Torah</i> -reading cycle is celebrated.  Shemini Atzeret marks the beginning of the rainy season in Israel and, therefore this day includes the year's first prayer for rain.
15- 24th October	Navaratri	Hindu 30	Navaratri means 'nine nights', which is how long the festival, in the honour of the goddess Durga, lasts. The day after the end of Navaratri is celebrated as the 'victorious tenth' (Vijaya Dashami) and huge figures of Ravana are filled with fireworks and burned on Ram Lila grounds
