School Trips

As a school, we have planned a broad and exciting range of visits/visitors to ensure that all children gain first hand experiences right from reception.

We have recently seen a huge increase in transport costs. This drives up the cost of visits and we know the financial pressures we are all facing at the moment. To ensure our children can still access these quality experiences, we have heavily subsided the visits and visitors and have implemented an instalment option for all families.

Unfortunately, school budgets are tighter than ever so, although we would love to be able to, we cannot afford to fully fund the visits across the school. We ask that you ensure the instalments are paid before the deadlines set to ensure we can proceed with the visits and visitors planned for this year. If we do not receive enough payments, we will sadly be forced to cancel some of the upcoming visits/visitors. If we do need to cancel any of the experiences, refunds will be provided to those who have already paid.

FOREST SCHOOL



At Forest School we have been embracing all the magic that the frosty mornings bring and delighting in the sparkling grass, glistening tree branches and crunchy leaves underfoot.

Keeping moving has been one way to stay warm so, when possible, children have used the all weather track to complete some laps on the bikes during their outdoor sessions.

We have been considering what the cold weather has been like for wild animals and topped up the corner of The Retreat with leaves and branches for any hedgehogs hibernating in the area.

Careful looking has been rewarded with finding tiny baby snails in the undergrowth. Bird feeders have been made using orange halves, filled with seeds and dotted about the outdoor areas. Tasty juice for the children while they were being made and fully biodegradable in the long run.









The bountiful sticks found in The Forest have been gathered to make mini rafts which proved to effectively float even with a 'cargo' of stones and small rocks.

Around Chinese New Year we hung paper lanterns in The Garden went looking for catkins that can be found in The Forest trees which are bountiful in China and associated with the coming of Spring. As this cold snap comes to an end, we are starting to think about seeds we can start to sow moving into the growing season.

A MESSAGE FROM YEAR SIX



Topic

This term the children have enjoyed getting stuck into their new topic of World War II. They started the term by creating some Blitz art for their topic books and for display. To do this, they explored using powder paints to create watercolours and blended the colours to look like a fiery sky.

In their history lessons, they have continued to learn more about the German invasion across Europe using the Blitzkrieg (lightning storm) attack. Because of the air raids on the cities of Great Britain, the children have also learned about evacuees and the reasons they needed to leave the cities and move to the countryside.

Reading

Our reading book for the whole term is When the Sky Falls. The children have loved getting to know an angry boy (Joseph) who has been sent to London during the Blitz from the Yorkshire countryside and his growing connection to a Gorilla that is kept at the city zoo.

We have also got stuck in to our reading carousel books and the children are being extremely conscientious when discussing their books within their groups and deciding how many chapters to read to ensure the book is read in two weeks. All the books the children are reading were previously entries to The Sussex Book Awards and are all high-quality texts. This experience is invaluable as it will encourage children to read books out of their comfort zone and they may fall in love with different authors.

As well as an opportunity to elevate books and further fan the love of a good read, the Carousel slot exercises a whole myriad of skills — time management, self-discipline, collaboration — and is a platform to express likes and dislikes in a considered and respectful manner. So far, two books in, it looks to be a great success with a real buzz, enthusiasm and debate around the books.

A MESSAGE FROM YEAR SIX

Writing

Using our guided reading book, When the Sky Falls, as a stimulus, we have immersed ourselves in a plethora of descriptive techniques such as: simile, metaphor and personification. The children have enjoyed creating their own year 6 versions of these techniques while describing devastated London and the experience of children leaving their families to be safe in the countryside. We have also started to learn about life as a soldier fighting on the beaches in France and what they may say in a letter to a loved one or their family back home in Britain.

Maths

We have been delving into fractions, decimals and percentages over the last five weeks. This has included lots of new learning which the children have been extremely resilient with. They have shown excellent reasoning skills in making links between the three different areas. They have particularly enjoyed learning about percentages and seeing how it is important in everyday life. Impressively, they have developed lots of different efficient strategies for finding different percentages of amounts. We are very proud of both the progress they have made this term and their attitude to improving themselves.







Science Week

The children had a great time preparing some experiments at home as well as in school to show the parents. We had many investigations and wow moments from our current learning of Light. Many children also designed their own investigations using electricity, forces and even density!

Next Term Events:

Year 6 SATs - talk for parents (and children) - Wednesday 22nd February @ 5pm in the junior hall.

<u>Take Shelter trip</u> — a visit to Downs Junior School where the children will get to meet local residents who remember the Brighton Blitz and will visit their refurbished air raid shelter under the playground. To make it feel as real as possible, the children will also experience what it was like to be down in the shelter during a German bombing raid.

The whole year group will visit over two days: Tuesday 21st February will be Chestnut and half of Sycamore; Thursday 23rd February will be Blackthorn and the other half of Sycamore. Your child will know which day they are going nearer the time.

<u>Let's Dance</u> Thursday 16th March @ The Brighton Dome. For those who are part of Let's Dance this year, there is a visit in the day time then the performance is in the evening. Ms Wilks will confirm times at a later date.

A MESSAGE FROM YEAR FIVE









The children in Year 5 have been extremely busy and hardworking throughout this short half term! We launched our Space topic by finding out what the children already knew and were amazed by their knowledge and interesting facts! Did you know that it takes Saturn 29 years to orbit the sun?

Our class reader - The Story of the Blue Planet - has allowed us to explore issues such as climate change and equality. We've extended the children's learning in these areas by researching inspirational characters such as Greta Thunberg and Maya Angelou. The book has also influenced our writing; including a wonderful narrative story about an alien landing on Mars, and most recently, a persuasive letter. Ask your child why the nail should be removed from the sun. They are very passionate about this!



For Science Week, we made a 'big bang' linked to our topic - Space - launching rockets into Mile Oak's atmosphere. The children learnt how a chemical reaction and some good aerodynamics, launches a rocket into space. This term, it was wonderful to give Walnut and Elder classes the opportunity to share their learning with you during Topic Share afternoon and the Science Showcase.

In maths, everything linked to 'multiplication' has been the focus. The children are beginning to understand how important their time tables knowledge is as they progress through the Year 5 maths curriculum and the TTRS lunchtime club has been extremely popular! We even have some Rock Legends in our midst. Please encourage your child to keep practicing at home too. Our focus in art has been sculpture, motivated by sculptor, Alexander Calder. He invented the first mobile, inspired by movement and space. The children, used wire and recycled objects to design and create space inspired mobiles of their own.

Geographically, we've been familiarising ourselves with the globe while using atlases and grid referencing skills to identify countries and their capitals. The children have dived deeper into learning about population growth, and how some areas of our planet are more densely populated than others.

Next term, our Space focus continues as we look at gravity and forces. Our class reader will be The Jamie Drake Equation by Christopher Edge and we've also got our exciting trip to The Observatory Science Centre in Herstmonceux to look forward to! We cannot wait!

A MESSAGE FROM YEAR FOUR



The start of Spring term kicked off with an exciting Roman day! The children looked amazing in their costumes and they participated in many activities throughout the day. Each child made a Roman calendar with an arty colosseum decoration. The children learnt all about how Roman soldiers dressed and they practiced some Roman marching orders along with battle manoeuvres. Perhaps your child could show you at home?!

We have also engaged in many Science activities this term. One day, the children walked into class to be greeted by frozen hands! After predicting what would happen to the ice hands over the course of the day, they monitored them every 1.5 hours by weighing the hands and measuring their temperature. By the end of the day, they had noticed a pattern! The ice hands had melted more and more as the day went on and the temperature increased.





Science week began with exciting shows! On the field, the children blasted rockets to see how far they would travel with different amounts of liquid inside. They then plotted their data on a line graph to analyse their findings. They also wrote instructions so others could have a go at a rocket experiment!

Next term we will be continuing our learning on the Romans, exploring the impact of Boudicca and how the Roman Empire came to an end. We have our Fishbourne Palace trip to look forward to, along with world book week activities. Please continue to support your child with learning their times tables. 10 minutes daily- playing TTRS on a tablet/phone will make all the difference for your child!


A MESSAGE FROM YEAR THREE



The children have had a fantastic half term learning all about the local history of Portslade. They enjoyed their trip where they had their very own tour of the Portslade ruins and got to dress up and act out some historical moments! They also enjoyed exploring some of the key buildings in Portslade village and have created some fantastic fact pages all about them.



The children have really enjoyed reading Tilly and the Time Machine during whole class guided reading sessions and have produced some fantastic work, linked to VIPERS.





During science week, the children fully immersed themselves into lots of scientific tasks and learnt so much from our workshop. Their favourite part was designing and making their own rockets and watching them (well most!) shoot into the air, after a chemical reaction!



Next half term the topic will be 'European Countries - UK and France'. During this topic, the children will read 'The Train Mouse' in their class guided reading sessions. This key text will also inspire their independent writing. They will be comparing the UK to France. They will be exploring the human and physical features of the UK in comparison to France. In DT, they will be exploring and making salad niçoise and trying French baguettes.



Please continue to keep up the hard work with TTRS at home and keep practising the 2s, 3s, 4s, 5s. 8s and 10 times tables and the related division facts. The children are becoming so confident with these now, which is really supporting their fluency. They have enjoyed exploring the different patterns in each of the times tables.









A MESSAGE FROM YEAR TWO









Year 2 have a had a busy start to 2023! Our topic this half term has been 'Ice, Ice, Baby!' and we have loved learning all about the cold parts of the world. Our main story has been The Snow Dragon, which we did a fantastic job of retelling and writing our own endings. We also created some beautiful ice collages and Snow Dragon sketches for our learning journals. We made some brilliant penguin puppets for DT, which focused on pivots and levers. We had a lovely time at the Mosque in Hove and learnt all about the five pillars of Islam and how Muslims pray. In maths, we started our learning on multiplication and have begun to look at groups of 2, 10 and 5.

Our topic next half term is 'The Great Outdoors'. We are very excited to read and re-tell 'The Snail and the Whale'. We will continue our work on multiplication and progress to division! In science, we will be experimenting with what plants need to grow. We will practice our sewing skills in DT and build our sketching skills in art. We are also looking forward to a Forest School experience within our school grounds.

Explorers!

We have learned about key explorers, Christopher Columbus, Neil Armstrong and Amelia Earhart. We have been writing factual reports about these significant figures in History. The children are becoming so focused on what they write, reading back and checking their ideas. They are applying their phonics to all aspects of their writing, which is great to see! Whilst writing character descriptions, the children have also developed their skills in writing adjectives.

PE

In addition to our games and dance learning, we have enjoyed our dance workshop with Nadia. The children developed a dance sequence based on Hakunah Matata from the Lion King. They then performed to all of the other children in KS1 in the afternoon. In the final week, we have taken part in a Circus Skills workshop and a Chinese New year Dragon Dance!

Science

Reading 'Egg Drop' by Mini Grey has inspired us to see if eggs really can fly....or at least try and protect them as they plummet to the ground from the top of the Science bus! Children applied their knowledge of everyday materials and worked in science groups - collaborating and designing an egsperiment. They then shared their learning in our Science Assembly. To showcase other Science learning, the children performed a Seed Song, a Thunderstorm body percussion AND joined in with the Watercycle Rap! The children eggsplained about their Egg drop and talked about the cars that they made in Design and Technology.

Next half term:

Our next topic is called 'Tell me a Tale', and is based on traditional stories, specifically looking at Little Red Riding Hood, a traditional tale and a modern update involving a lion. Rainbow Theatre will be visiting the school with their immersive Fairy tales show and Year 1 will all take part in this together. This is a terrific experience and really helps to embed understanding of the special features of traditional tales. We shall also be taking part in a variety of World Book day activities and will be composing a soundscape about Little Red Riding Hood.



RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Spring 2 Religious festival calendar

February	19	e e	
21 st February	Shrove Tuesday	Christian	This festival is often called 'Pancake Day', as pancakes use up all the rich foods before Lent. The name comes from the old word 'shriving', which means to listen to someone's sins and forgive them. In Anglo-Saxon England, Christians would go to church on Shrove Tuesday to confess their sins and clean their soul. In other words, they would be 'shriven'.
22 nd February	Ash Wednesday	Christian	This first day of Lent recalls the temptations Jesus faced for forty days in the wilderness.
22 nd February - 6 th April	Lent	Christian	This is a period of forty days of fasting and self-discipline that leads up to Easter. Traditionally, Christians give up something during this time to mark the forty days Jesus spent in the wilderness. Many Christians feel it is a time for study groups, prayer and Bible reading.
March	•		
1st March	St David's Day	Christian National	This is the anniversary of the death of St David, the 6th Century patron saint of Wales.
6 th March	Magha Puja	Buddhist	This is a celebration in honour of the Buddhist community. It remembers when Buddha taught the main principles of the Dharma and set out his teachings. The day is observed with meditation, chanting and the reaffirmation of people's commitment to Buddhist practice.
6 th March	Purim	Jewish	Purim recalls the saving of the Jewish community of Persia, as retold in the Book of Esther (the Megillah), which is read through twice in each synagogue. The name of Haman is drowned out with rattles and hooters and boos by the congregation whenever it is read.
7 th March	Lailat-Ul- Bara'ah (The Night Of Forgiveness)	Muslim	Muslims seek forgiveness for their sins at this time. Many believe that on this night, a person's destiny is fixed by Allah for the coming year. The night is spent in prayer, asking for forgiveness and God's guidance. Some fast during the daytime in preparation. In certain parts of the world Muslims visit the graves of relatives, and the giving of charity is also traditional. In many places the night is marked with fireworks.
8th March	Holi	Hindu	This is a spring festival lasting one to five days. Bonfires are lit and coloured powders and dyes are thrown over people. Various stories of Vishnu and of Krishna and the <i>gopis</i> (milkmaids) are related throughouthe festival.
17 th March	St Patrick's Day	Christian / National	The patron saint of Ireland, who lived in Britain in the 4th century CE, became a priest and set out to evangelise the Irish. His symbol is the shamrock, sprigs of which are worn on this day.
22 nd March	Ramadan	Muslim	Ramadan is the 9th month of the Islamic Calendar, when the Prophet received the first revelation of verses of the Qur'an. It is the holiest month for Muslims, and they dedicate themselves to spiritual renewal, prayer and intensive devotional reading of the Qur'an. During the month of Ramadan Muslims are required to fast from daybreak until after sunset. No food or drink may be consumed during the hours of fasting, and those fasting must also abstain from smoking and from sexual relations. After the custom of the Prophet, the fast is traditionally broken each evening by taking dates and water.
30th March	Rama Navami	Hindu	This is the birthday of Rama. It is one of the most important festivals for Hindus.


